FIRST CHURCH NOTES

On the Spread of the Gospel from the Old World to the New

In this little part of New England called the First Congregational Church of Gray, we stand on the shoulders of giants. It is a mighty tradition to which we are heir, a tradition that begins, of course with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob; Sarah, Rebecca and Rachel; Moses, Jesus and the Biblical heroes; and also with the heroes of the Reformation, people like John Knox and Oliver Cromwell in Great Britain, with the Puritans and Pilgrims of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, people like Cotton Mather and Jonathan Edwards, and continues through the Transcendentalists like Henry David Thoreau, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Harriet Beecher Stowe and other geniuses of the great revolutionary experiment called the United States of America. In the 20th Century just past and now in our own century, there are too many geniuses to count.

To help us understand where we are as a congregation in this tradition this summer. I have focused on the travels of Saint Paul in the Book of Acts and supplemented his story and preaching with selections from a variety of American poets. I will continue to do so throughout the fall until we begin Advent, when I will focus on the traditional Messianic prophecies. I hope everyone is enjoying following the movement of the Gospel from Asia to Europe and from Europe to America as much as I am.

In order to savor this journey just a little bit more, allow me to introduce one of my favorite historians, Perry Miller, who taught at Harvard in the 1950s and 60s. He re-introduced Americans to the Puritans and argued that their theological thought - and there was a lot of it - was still important for understanding ourselves today. While still in mid-career he wrote about what fired him to study American history, namely his experience as a young man in the Army in 1926:

> "It was given to me," he wrote, " ... disconsolate on the edge of a jungle of central Africa, to have thrust upon me the mission of expounding what I took to be the innermost propulsion of the United States, while supervising, in that barbaric tropic, the unloading of drums of case oil flowing out of the inexhaustible wilderness of America....


Expenses for the month of July totaled \$7833.23. To meet the budget for 2017, our monthly income should be \$9.609.92.

Looking Backwards

We're hearing a lot about the upcoming eclipse lately even though it will be only partial in this part of the country. I guess I'm one of the few who can remember a total eclipse that was actually visible in Gray. I was maybe eight or ten at the time and then as now the news was full of the prospect --what to look for, how animals, domestic and wild might react, how to protect your eyes, etc. etc.

I think even back then some enterprising entrepreneur was making and selling special viewing spectacles but that sort of luxury wasn't on our horizon. Our eye protection was homemade and consisted of a piece of window glass -- probably from a broken window -- held over a smokey candle flame until it was thoroughly blackened. (This wasn't as easy as it sounds -- you had to keep it moving or it would shatter from the uneven heat.)

The alternative was one or more overexposed black and white photo negatives -- remember them? -- if one wasn't dark enough layer them. (If any oculist is reading this don't have a heart attack; I'm 94 and can still see to read!)

Then as now we had been alerted to watch for waves of light and shadow as the moon's mountains slid across the edge of the sun's disc, to look for "Bailey's beads" and the corona. The total phase was supposed to last a minute or two but it seemed like only a few seconds. Then the show was about over and as the light returned the roosters greeted the dawn for the second time that day.

What I believe caught my imagination, among the fuel drums, was a realization of the uniqueness of the American experience; even then I could dimly make out the portent for the future of the world, looking upon these tangible symbols of

the republic's appalling power. I could see no way of coping with the problem except by going to the beginning. ... The beginning I sought was inevitably – being located in the 17th century – theological."

What was the result of Perry Miller's quest? What provided and still provides the innermost propulsion of these United States? I believe the answer in brief is one word, much meditated upon by Paul, Luther, Calvin and the Reformers, and ultimately Abraham Lincoln and every living American: freedom. The quest for freedom is what America has been about from the very beginning, Christianity also.

I will admit that Jesus did not mention freedom very much. He used the word in just two passages, one in Matthew and one in John, for five uses of the Greek word for freedom, "eleutheros," altogether. "Eleutheros" has become a botanical term which reveals the meaning of this word: It means, simply, "wild," as in "eleuthero ginseng," wild ginseng, which you can get at the health food store and grows all over the northeastern United States. It's the best ginseng root in the world, I might add.

But it is no exaggeration to say that freedom was of utmost import for Paul. Paul uses the word "freedom" in his writings over twenty times and it is a key concept in his letters to the Romans, Corinthians and Galatians. In understanding Jesus sets us free from sin, free from the fear of death, free from fear itself, free from death itself. If Paul were here to be questioned on the matter he might say that Jesus did not talk about freedom much, but He WAS freedom, and love, and a lot of other qualities besides. Jesus Christ embodied freedom and love and made it possible for us to exercise both.

We will continue our journey with Paul as this summer draws to a close. We will continue to ponder the meaning of his message, particularly his understanding of freedom, as we Americans struggle with what it means to be a free people in a time of deep political division.
