## Summer into Fall; What We're Doing; 500 Years of Reformation; Enjoying Life.

My sermons this summer have focused on the Acts of the Apostles, the travels of Saint Paul and the Old Testament background of Paul's preaching. Sermons are posted, both print and video, on the church Facebook page on Monday or Tuesday. I also post sermons in print on my personal Facebook, Twitter and LinkedIn pages.

We will begin an educational series on October 15 at 6 o'clock at Sally Johnston's house, beginning with several episodes of Bill Moyers interviewing Joseph Campbell in the series called "The Power of Myth."

Since 5:30 Friday afternoon is not a good time for everyone, I am thinking of offering Bend, Stretch and Breathe, a movement practice rather like yoga, at an additional time during the week, perhaps Thursday at 2. Please let me know if you would be interested in joining me for this joyful movement practice.

October 31 will mark the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther posting his ninety-five theses for debate on the door of the church in Wittenberg. We will do something special on the last Sunday of October, the traditional Reformation Sunday. The sermon that Sunday and for a few Sundays before and after will therefore consider Luther's Reformation in relation to the initial wave of reformation set off by Jesus and the early church of Paul. We will also consider where we stand within the waves of reformation today.

We will celebrate All Saints' Day the following Sunday, November 5.

Shortly after I arrived in Gray, I found this document and posted it on the shelves in front of my desk in order to remind me:  
2016 Goals for Congregation and Minister:

1. To foster an environment where parishioners feel safe, respected and comfortable expressing their thoughts and feelings.
2. To rebuild a sense of community/family with other local churches.
3. To learn how to manage conflict in healthy ways.

Through the free will offering, we were able to send \$341 to the Hurricane Harvey Recovery through the UCC. Thanks to one and all.

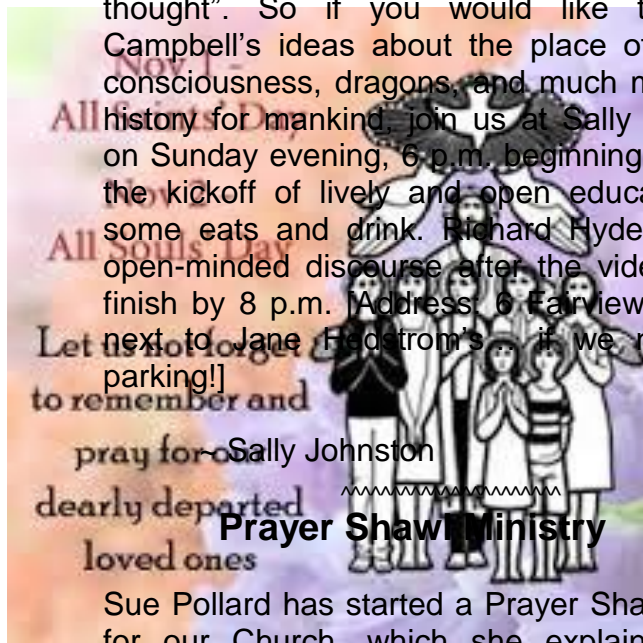
Joan Preston will speak on Neighbors in Need in October, with an option for Hurricane Irma Recovery.

### Prayer Shawl Ministry

Sue Pollard has started a Prayer Shawl Ministry for our Church, which she explained to the congregation on September 10<sup>th</sup>. Many churches around the country have such a Ministry, where members create, either through knitting or crocheting, prayer shawls. The shawls are garments that surround the wearer both physically and spiritually in prayer and celebration, in joy and sorrow.

Churches have also started including in this Ministry what they call Pocket Prayer Squares – small squares (4") of fabric sewn together with a cross inside. The square can be carried in a purse, backpack, put on a bedside table, taken to the hospital, held while praying or taken when

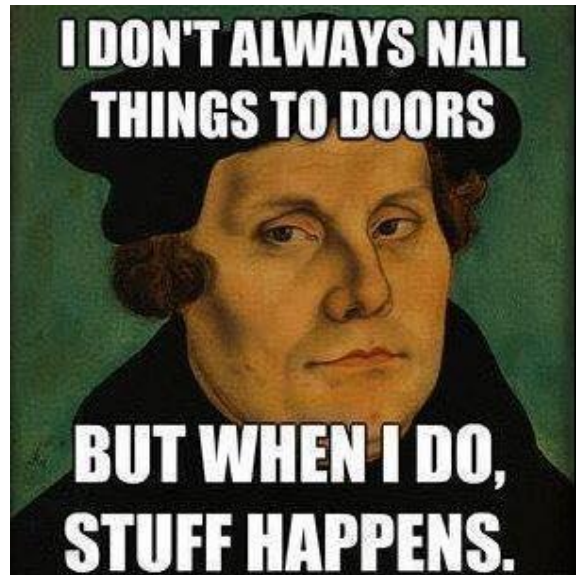
traveling. They are small and light enough to send through the mail.

Paula McDonald has knitted and given us 3 prayer shawls to get us started. Sue has created a number of squares. These shawls and squares were blessed by the congregation on the 10th.
